Grammar in all writing:

- Use a variety of sentence types in all of our writing
 - Simple, compound and complex (with a variety of adverbial clauses starting with subordinating conjunctions, and relative clauses).
- Use a variety of clauses at varying points with sentences for impact and to emphasise information
- Convey complicated information concisely by using pre- and post-modification of nouns, including using relative clauses, expanded noun phrases and prepositional phrases.
- Use a range of verb forms, particularly the perfect form. (To form the perfect tense
 we use the present / past / future form of the verb to have and the past participle of
 the main verb I have walked / I had walked / I would have walked).
- Use modal verbs and adverbs to indicate possibility.



Punctuation

- Same as Year 4
- Use punctuation for parenthesis: brackets, commas and dashes
- Use commas for clarity and to separate clauses.
- Use colons and semicolons to punctuate detailed lists.



Writing to entertain:

- Narratives
- Descriptions character and setting
- Poetry

Structure:

- Narratives to be organised with a clear opening, build-up, climax and resolution
- Use dialogue and /or reported speech to develop the plot or characters.
- Make characters believable by using 'Show not tell' to describe feelings through reactions throughout the writing.
- Create tension and pace in fiction writing by using the rule of 3: short sentences, 3 events in a plot and/or 3 sequence verbs within a sentence.
- Use figurative language by using similes (not clichés), metaphors and onomatopoeia.
- Use the setting (weather and time) to create mood.
- Use shifts in time e.g. flashbacks.



Writing to inform:

- Factual report
- Newspaper report
 - Introduction of 5Ws and reported speech
- Explanation text new to Year 5!

Structure:

- Introduction
 - Clearly sets out the purpose of the text
 - Awareness of reader though the use of rhetorical questions and 2nd person
- Main body
 - All paragraphs begin with a topic sentence introducing the content of the paragraph
 - Use of the active/passive voice.
 - Chronological order or not? Use of adverbs and prepositions for time.
 - Final sentence in the paragraph either summarises the information or links onto what comes next.
- Conclusion
 - Summarises the text or signposts to further information or reading.
